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ADMISSION AT THIRTEEN

The start of the entry process is a boy's Registration on the School List. This may be done at any time after birth, but certainly at least three years before entry. Registration consists of filling in a form and paying a small Registration Fee, and can be done before or after the first visit. The first visit usually consists of a general tour of the School with both a pupil and a member of the teaching staff, followed by an interview with the Headmaster and/or Registrar. Subsequent opportunities to visit include the House selection days, open mornings and taster afternoons, to all of which parents will be invited with their sons. About two and a half years before entry, a report will be requested from the pupil's Prep School. Boys will also be interviewed during House selection visits. If both are satisfactory, Charterhouse will offer a guaranteed place - which is subject to acceptance through the Common Entrance Exam - and ask for the initial deposit. A final deposit is requested a year before entry.

The Common Entrance Exam

The normal entry exam is the Common Entrance Exam - an exam common to most independent schools - which is sat in the June of the year of entry. Candidates are required to take Mathematics, English, Science, History, Geography, Religious Studies and a main Modern Language. Latin and Greek are optional. Only in exceptional circumstances, and by agreement with the Preparatory School, may these papers be varied.

Other Entry

Charterhouse sets its own tests in English, Maths and Science for those who have not been prepared for Common Entrance. These are normally taken at pupils' own schools in January of the year of entry, and successful candidates are offered confirmed places then.

Scholarships

Foundation Scholarship candidates sit Mathematics, English and four other subjects chosen from French, Latin, Geography, Additional Mathematics, History and Science. Greek may also be taken as an extra subject. Details of scholarships awarded by the School can be found on page 6.

ADMISSION AT SIXTH FORM

There are usually fifty places available for girls and up to twenty for boys seeking entry as boarders to the Sixth Form. Twenty-seven boys and girls will also be admitted each year to Fletcherites, the Sixth Form Day House. Parents should contact the Admissions Office in the summer of the year prior to September entry. Places are awarded on the basis of selective examination and interview, which are conducted in the November of the year prior to the year of admission.

Day Boarders

A limited number of boys and girls who live within very easy reach of Charterhouse can be admitted as Day Boarders, at the discretion of the Headmaster. Each becomes a member of one of the boarding Houses and participates fully in the life of the School. They are expected to attend Chapel and remain at School in the evening until their Housemaster gives them permission to go home (not before 9.00pm).

THE ACADEMIC CURRICULUM

THE UNDER SCHOOL

Fourth Form (Year 9)

The aim of this first year in the School is to provide a broad academic foundation at the appropriate standard, and to start preparing pupils for the subjects they will go on to take at GCSE and in the Sixth Form.

All boys normally study English, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, French, History, Religious Education, Art, Design Technology and Music. Boys also study Geography or Greek, German or Spanish and Latin or Classical Civilisation. During their first year the use of IT is closely integrated into the teaching of other subjects. Pupils gain much experience in using software as a tool to support their learning rather than as an academic subject.

Remove and Fifth Form (Year 10 and Year 11)

All boys study English, Mathematics, Biology, Chemistry and Physics for IGCSE, and a main Modern Language (French, Spanish or German) for GCSE. They also study our own English Literature course (which is more challenging than GCSE and leads to an examination certified by Charterhouse).

Each boy also chooses three other subjects to study for the two years, leading to a qualification at GCSE or IGCSE level. These options include Art, Classical Civilisation, Design Technology, French, Geography, German, Greek, History, Latin, Music, Religious Studies and Spanish. Most combinations of these subjects are possible and advice on suitable subjects is given towards the end of the Fourth Form.

THE SPECIALISTS (SIXTH FORM)

Charterhouse provides pupils with a choice of two complementary courses of study: the IB Diploma Programme or a combination of Pre-U and A Level courses. Both of these academically rigorous courses prepare pupils effectively for university and enable applicants from Charterhouse to stand out in an increasingly crowded field. Pupils do not sit examinations until the end of the second year of study and this provides valuable additional teaching time. Every opportunity is taken to promote a genuine appreciation of academic disciplines as well as fostering life-long learning.

The virtues of both of these courses and their grading structures have been widely recognised and very much appreciated by admissions tutors at British universities including Cambridge, Oxford, Imperial and the other prestigious universities in the Russell Group. In addition, the IB Diploma Programme benefits from widespread international recognition.

In addition to the courses mentioned above, all Specialist pupils complete a Research Essay or the IB Diploma Programme's Extended Essay as well as a course in Creativity, Action and Service.

The Research Essay / The Extended Essay

This 4,000 word essay is an important part of Charterhouse's academic curriculum beyond the confines of subject syllabuses. During the second term of their first year as Specialists, pupils are required to choose a topic area; with the support of a supervisor, they then research and plan carefully before writing the essay during the summer holiday.

Creativity, Action and Service

Education does not only take place within the classroom. Extra-curricular activities provide all Carthusians with many opportunities for personal development through learning from experience. This experience comes from pupils' active participation in activities beyond those of their chosen academic subjects; the Charterhouse CAS programme aims to ensure that all Specialists take advantage of the wide range of opportunities available to initiate, plan, engage and reflect upon their experiences.

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme

Charterhouse is an IB World School and offers the IB Diploma Programme. Since its conception in 1968, this highly reputed course of study has promoted international-mindedness as well as intellectual rigour and academic flexibility. It is likely to appeal to pupils who wish to develop these skills, as well as to those who do not feel ready to specialise in the way that has been traditional in this country.

Assessment

Pupils study six subjects (including English, a second language, a humanity, a science and mathematics), with three of these taken at Standard Level and three at Higher Level (this allows for greater depth of study in those areas). Up to 7 points are awarded for each subject regardless of the level at which the subject is studied. In addition, three Core points are available for the quality of work in the Theory of Knowledge course as well as the Extended Essay. A total of 45 points is available overall and this allows universities carefully to differentiate an applicant's attributes. It is also a requirement for the award of the Diploma that pupils should satisfactorily complete the CAS programme.

Pre-U and A Level Courses

Cambridge Pre-U

The Cambridge Pre-U courses were established in 2008 and Charterhouse, along with several other leading schools, was at the forefront of their development. Pupils sat the first examinations in the summer of 2010. In order to take advantage of the best available subject syllabuses, the majority of departments now offer the Cambridge Pre-U. These courses will appeal to those who seek to specialise and will provide pupils with an opportunity to study exciting and challenging material in depth.

Pre-U courses are offered in the following subjects:

Literature in English, Mathematics, Further Mathematics, History, Geography, Latin, Classical Greek, French, German, Spanish, Economics, Business and Management, Physics, Chemistry, Music and Art.

A Levels

There are some courses which are not currently offered by Cambridge Pre-U and there are also some subjects for which an A Level has been chosen by a department as the best available course. However, like the Pre-U courses, these subjects are assessed at the end of the second year of teaching.

A Levels (terminally assessed) are offered in the following subjects:

Biology, Theology Philosophy and Ethics, Government and Politics, Classical Civilisation, Design Technology and Theatre Studies.

Assessment

Both Pre-U and A Level courses are terminally assessed at the end of the second year of teaching.

Pre-U courses are graded on a nine-point scale (rather than the five-point A-E scale at A level). There are three Distinction, three Merit and three Pass grades. The three levels of Distinction grade are equivalent to or beyond that of an A grade at A level, and so the very best candidates are able to distinguish themselves by gaining higher grades than are available at A Level.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR ENTRY AT THIRTEEN

All Scholarships and Awards (except Exhibitions) may be increased by bursaries to the value of the FULL SCHOOL FEE in cases of proven financial need, provided that separate application for a bursary is made at least three weeks before the scholarship.

Academic

The **Foundation Scholarship** examinations will take place on 3rd – 5th May 2011. Ten Foundation Scholarships are offered, worth 10% of the School fee. Boys must be between the ages of 12 and 14 on 1st September (unless special permission is granted by the Registrar) and need not be registered for entry to the School.

In addition there will be up to five Exhibitions, worth 5% of the School fee. These Exhibitions are awarded to those who show special promise in one particular subject or for a general performance that is sound, but below that appropriate for the award of a Foundation Scholarship. In accordance with our Statutes there are never fewer than fifty Foundation Scholars in the School at any one time; they are distributed among the eleven Houses.

There is one **Reginald and Maurice Benn Scholarship** for distinction in Classics in the Foundation Scholarship Examination. The value of this award is £1,000 a year and preference is given to boys in whose case there is financial need. The Benn Scholarship may be held in addition to other Scholarships.

The **Blackstone Award**, for the sons of lawyers, is made two years before the winner joins the school. The award for entry in September 2013 will be worth 5% of the School fee during the scholar's time at Charterhouse. Candidates will sit tests at their own schools at the beginning of March 2011 and selected candidates will come to Charterhouse to be interviewed in April. *The closing date for entries is 4th February 2011.*

The **Peter Attenborough Awards** are given to boys who are academically sound and fit any of the following criteria:-

- (a) Approaching Scholarship standard in two of the following categories: academic, music or art.
- (b) An outstanding talent in a non-scholarship field, eg sport.
- (c) A genuine 'all-rounder' with real evidence of potential leadership.

Five Awards, each worth 5% of the School fee, will be awarded annually. Four will be awarded in the March immediately prior to entry and the fifth will be awarded at the end of a boy's first year at Charterhouse. These Awards are for those who do not win an Academic, Music or Art Scholarship to Charterhouse. In the event of a candidate subsequently winning a Foundation Scholarship in May, he will have to relinquish his Peter Attenborough Award which will then be given to the runner-up. Applications should be made by 4th February 2011 after which a shortlist will be drawn up, and selected candidates will be invited to Charterhouse for assessment early in March.

Music

Up to five Scholarships will be offered, worth 10% of the School fee. Music Tuition on two instruments is free for Music Scholars. In addition, two Exhibitions will be offered which provide free Music Tuition on two instruments. Examinations will be held on 1st and 2nd February 2011.

Art

Two Scholarships are offered worth 10% of the School fee, and two Exhibitions worth 5% of the School fee. Examinations will be held on 3rd February 2011.

Sport

Two Park House Awards, each worth 10% of the School fee, are offered for outstanding sportsmen. The final selection will be held in May 2011.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR ENTRY AT SIXTH FORM

Academic

Up to six **Sir Robert Birley Scholarships**, worth 10% of the School fee, are offered on the basis of performance in the entrance examination and interview. There will also be up to seven Exhibitions awarded, worth 5% of the School fee.

Music

Three scholarships are offered, worth 10% of the School fee. In addition, there is the **John Pilling Organ Scholarship**, worth 10% of the School fee. Music tuition on two instruments is free for Music Scholars.

Art

Two scholarships are offered worth 10% of the School fee.

Pupils joining the School at the beginning of the Sixth Form are eligible for **Honorary Foundation Scholarships** at the end of their first year.

BURSARIES

Bursaries are available for all winners of Scholarships when there is a proven financial need. Parents will be asked to complete a confidential statement of financial circumstances form before the selection process takes place.

There is also a limited number of Entrance Bursaries for boys or girls who would benefit from a Charterhouse education whose parents cannot afford the fees. Early application is advisable (i.e. about 3 years before entry in Year 9, or during Year 10 for entry in Year 12), as funds are limited. Parents will be asked to complete a confidential statement of financial circumstances form and will be invited to meet the Bursar to explain their needs.

HOUSES

Carthusians are divided amongst eleven boarding Houses and Fletcherites, the House for day pupils in the Sixth Form. The original three, Saunderites, Verites and Gownboys, known as the Block Houses, together with one other, Girdlestoneites, are grouped at the centre of the School and are collectively known as the 'Old' Houses. The other seven Houses, Lockites, Weekites, Hodgsonites, Daviesites, Bodeites, Pageites and Robinites, were re-sited in the 1970s and are called the 'New' Houses. Fletcherites opened in September 2010.

All registered boys will be invited with their parents to attend a House selection afternoon during the course of Year 6. They will visit up to three Houses, selected by the Registrar, and will then be able to express an order of preference, though there is no guarantee that they will be offered a place in their first choice House. House places will be offered at the same time as places in the School.

There will be a General List for boys who choose not to accept the House place offered or have not attended a selection day, and they will be able to visit at least two Houses during the year of entry. Charterhouse will seek to ensure that each boy enters a House he and his parents have chosen.

Pupil Complaints

If a pupil has a complaint it may be addressed to the Head of House, Head of School, Head Girl, Tutor, Matron, Housemaster, Master of the Under School, Assistant Headmaster (Pastoral) or Deputy Headmaster. If matters cannot be resolved by them, or if circumstances dictate a direct reference to him, the Headmaster can be consulted, or the School Medical Officer, who is the senior staff member responsible for the complaints procedure. Discipline

Breaches of House Rules (which are published by the Housemaster) are dealt with by Housemasters or House Monitors.

The School Rules are set out at the back of the Calendar.

Minor breaches of School Rules are normally dealt with by Housemasters or School Monitors. More serious or repeated offences are normally dealt with by the Assistant Headmaster (Pastoral). Cases where suspension or expulsion may be necessary are dealt with by the Headmaster.

The normal punishments at Charterhouse are armoury run, extra school, extra labour, gating, school punishment, suspension and expulsion.

GENERAL

Home and School

There are three terms (or Quarters) in the School year: Oration Quarter, Long Quarter and Cricket Quarter. Mid-term Exeats are two weeks in the OQ and one week in LQ and CQ. In addition there are two short leave weekends in the OQ and one in LQ when the School closes and all pupils go home or to their guardians. On other weekends Charterhouse allows a great deal of flexibility to suit parents. All boarding pupils must attend the School Sunday service – which on most Sundays is at 7pm – but may go home for Saturday evening provided, of course, that they do not have a School or House commitment. Day pupils and day boarders are only required to attend a limited number of Sunday services.

There is a major programme of weekend and sporting fixtures, plays and concerts as well as a wide range of optional activities and outings for those remaining at the School. In addition, all the main School facilities such as Studio, Technical Centre, Computer Room and the Sports Centre are open as usual.

School Shops

A subsidiary trading company, Charterhouse Enterprises Limited, operates a shop within the School grounds, where books, stationery, clothing (both new and second-hand), toiletries and sports equipment are stocked. The tuckshop (called "Crown") is located between the Under Green and Maniacs playing fields. The Rackets Professional runs his own shop at the Rackets Courts.

Sports Centre Club

All pupils are required to enrol as members of the Sports Centre Club, the facilities of which are part of the facilities available to all Carthusians. The membership fee is included as part of the School Fee. The Sports Centre is administered by Charterhouse Sports Centre Ltd, a separate company with its own Board of Directors, as a members only club. Members of the public may join the club.

Health

The School Medical Officer looks after all Carthusians under the terms of the National Health Service. She is responsible for all medical treatment and advising the Headmaster on matters concerning the health of the School. The Hunt Health Centre (the School Sanatorium) is run by two State qualified nurses. Specialist care is available at hospitals in Guildford. Carthusians may also be treated privately by specialist consultants according to parents' wishes.

Insurance

1. *Fee Remission:* An optional insurance is available through the School.
2. *Personal Possessions:* The School does not accept responsibility for the personal possessions of pupils. Parents are responsible for the insurance of their children's possessions whilst they are at the School and this can be arranged on application to the Bursar.
3. *Private Medical Insurance:* An optional insurance is available through the School's brokers at very competitive rates.
4. *Personal Accident:* The School insures all pupils throughout the whole of their school career, both in term-time and during holidays, against personal accidents which result in either permanent disability or death. Enquiries concerning this scheme should be referred to the Bursar.
5. *Dental Accidents and Emergencies:* An optional insurance is available through the School.

FEES

The Governing Body normally reviews the School Fees during Cricket Quarter when it sets the Fees for the forthcoming financial year commencing in August and ending at the following 31st July. For the convenience of parents and of administration, the annual fees are apportioned in three equal amounts linked to each school term, irrespective of the length of that term, Exeat, holidays etc. The Governing Body reserves the right to alter the school fees or to charge an additional supplementary fee should it become necessary to do so. Periods spent away from the School by pupils between nominated term dates do not qualify for refunds of fees. If the pupil is absent due to illness, please see Insurance, Fee Remission, on page 10 for details. School and Music Fees are reviewed annually.

School fees are payable before the first day of each term. The current School Fees (2010/2011) are:-

Boarders: £9,810 per term Day Boarders: £8,110 per term
Sixth Form Day Pupils (Fletcherites): £6,965 per term

Music tuition fees are billed at the end of each term. The current fees for Music Tuition (2010/2011) are:-

First Instrument: £305 per term
Second and each subsequent Instrument: £260 per term

Pupils who enter Associated Board practical examinations are offered additional aural tuition for which an extra charge is made. There is also an additional tuition charge for pupils who are required to do a theory examination.

The School Fees cover all expenses except music tuition, any optional extra tuition in individual subjects and certain items shown below:-

Stationery; some school books; examination fees; travelling expenses and advances by Housemasters; the costs of expeditions to theatres, films, exhibitions etc. relevant to work in School (the Headmaster's approval for such expeditions has to be obtained by the organising Masters); breakages, hair cutting, dry cleaning, etc.; medicines and special medical equipment.

Fee Payment

The School Fees for each academic year should be paid by one of the following methods:-

- (i) The amount of each term's fees in full by Direct Debit on the first day of term but, if this is a non-banking day, then on the first banking day following.
- (ii) Monthly Direct Debit on the 10th day of each month commencing in September at the start of the academic year until the following June but, if this is a non-banking day, on the first banking day following. The first term will be payable in four equal instalments (September to December). The following two terms are payable in three equal instalments i.e. LQ from January to March and CQ April to June.

Extras and Music Fees will be payable by Direct Debit after the end of each term, and either on the first day of the following term or on the first Banking day following the start of that term.

Parents who pay School Fees from non-UK Bank or Building Society Accounts, or who arrange payment of the School Fees from several different sources, will be required to pay each term's fees in full by cheque, bank draft or transfer *by the first day of each term*.

Prepayment of Fees

Parents may, if they wish, make an advantageous lump sum payment (Advanced Fees) at any time after registration to cover any part of the fees. Details may be obtained from the Bursary.

CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION

Admission to Charterhouse is on the understanding that the parents or guardian accept:

1. the terms and descriptions set out in the Prospectus, this Further Information Booklet and the Terms and Conditions included in all new pupils' joining packages, as amended from time to time.
2.
 - a) the School Rules;
 - b) the School's Policies, as displayed on house notice boards from time to time;
 - c) the School's Review Procedure.
3. the requirement that all accounts in respect of pupils are payable in accordance with the procedures outlined in the Fees section of this booklet and that in the event of failure to comply with this condition the parents will incur either an administration charge for any unpaid Direct Debit or a daily surcharge of such amounts as may be determined from time to time by the Governing Body for late payment from the first day of term. Non-payment of accounts may lead to the Governing Body requiring the removal of a boy or girl or refusing him or her re-admission.
4. that parents will appoint a readily accessible guardian in the United Kingdom.
5. that pupils are expected to exhibit a high standard of personal behaviour and to work to the best of their ability at all times. Any pupil who does not do so may, after warning, be required to leave the School at any time by the Headmaster or may not be permitted to enter Removes or either of the Specialist years.
6. that the removal of a boy or girl from the School may be required by the Headmaster in accordance with the School's terms and conditions.
7. that complaints by parents about any aspect of the School are made reasonably and promptly.
8. that parents' intention to withdraw a boy or girl from the School must be given in writing to the Headmaster a clear term in advance. Where such notice is not given a sum equal to a full term's fees must be paid in lieu of notice.

There are no AS Level results this year because Pre-Us are being studied in most subjects, and those which are still doing A Levels will do all the exams in the second year of the Sixth Form.

HIGHER EDUCATION

These statistics are compiled on the basis of the known destinations for 2009 leavers.

Practically all our leavers in 2009 went on to Higher Education, the majority to their first choice of University, about 45% after taking a Gap Year. 96% of our leavers went to Universities in the UK with the remaining going to the USA, including Columbia and Johns Hopkins, or Hong Kong Universities.

There were 12 Oxford and 6 Cambridge places (10%) in this year group; the next most popular universities are listed below.

Leeds (14), Exeter (13), Manchester, Newcastle (12), Bristol (11), UCL (10), Durham (9), LSE (7) Bath, Edinburgh, Imperial (5). These are amongst the 38 UK University destinations of Carthusians.

In the Leavers 2009 year group the most popular courses were:

Engineering, Maths and Sciences (31%), Social Sciences including Economics, Politics and Human Geography (26%), Humanities including History, English, Philosophy, Theology and Classics (19%), Business and Management (8%), Modern Languages (6%) and Arts including Music, Art and Theatre Studies (5%).

Carthusians were admitted to over 100 different courses.
