About Sauderites:

Sauderites is one of four 'Old Houses' and occupies part of the original site of the School. Sauderites, along with Gownboys and Verites, predate the School's move to Godalming in 1872.

It is named after its first Housemaster, Dr Saunders, who was also Headmaster from 1832–53; at that time the Headmaster also ran one of the boarding Houses. This arrangement continued until the 1950s, and explains why the Headmaster's Study is nestled within the Sauderites buildings.

All boys in the Fourth Form share a room in a pair. They will study, socialise and sleep in their room. The boys will change room-pairings each half term, and so over the course of the first year a boy will share with six other boys.

The Sauderites Dining Room is located across the Scholars' Court, and boys eat all their meals there.

In 2021, Sauderites will move, with all its pupils, Housemaster and Matron, to a new boarding House across the playing fields, nestled between Daviesites and the Ben Travers Theatre.

Meet the House Team

Saunderites is run by the Housemaster, Mrs Allen with the help of the other resident members of staff – Mrs Pugh (Assistant Housemaster), Mrs O'Brien (Matron) and Mrs Brockwell (Relief Matron). One of these members of staff is always on duty and available in House.

Advice from Matron

Matron would like to offer a few pointers regarding your belongings and appearance.

- All clothes and shoes must be clearly marked with name tapes, including casual clothes, making them easier to return if lost. (Info on name tapes is in the “New Pupil Information” booklet.)
- All items of uniform must conform to the lists in the New Pupil Information booklet
- Please bring spare name labels in case any are lost or items are bought/replaced over the school year
- All clothes should be machine washable and tumble drier safe
- Please bring a personal mug which is easily identifiable as yours
- Ensure that your hair is regulation length and colour

Laundry

Your laundry is collected twice a week, and your bedding once a week. You will strip and remake your own bed each week.

Your clean washing will be returned to your shelf in the House laundry room for you to collect.

What to Bring?

In addition to packing all your uniform and sports kit, you will need the following:

HOUSEHOLD ITEMS

Duvet and 2 duvet covers

Pillow and 2 pillowcases

2 bath towels

1 mesh laundry bag (for underwear/socks)

Holdall with wheels

Coat hangers

Posters/pictures to decorate your noticeboard

Tuck box

Toiletries/wash kit

Desk lamp (non-halogen)

Alarm clock

Torch

Stationery



You will also need your own home clothes for evenings and weekends. Try to be selective about what you bring as you will not have huge walk-in wardrobes!

House Routines and Procedures



CLEANING

The House is cleaned every morning from Monday to Saturday. The cleaners are an integral part of the House team and take pride in their work, but it is everyone's job to keep the House looking good.

If you see litter around House, please place it in a bin. It is also a basic expectation that pupils will keep their rooms tidy and their floor and desk areas clear.



SIGNING OUT/SIGNING IN

You must use the signing out sheet whenever you leave House for any reason other than to attend meals, lessons and games. You must also sign in when you return to House.



VISITING OTHER HOUSES

Pupils may visit the ground floor common areas in other Houses during their free time (but not during hashes, study periods or Banco). It is essential that pupils visiting other Houses sign in and out in the House Visitors Book that is kept in the lobby in each House.



BUTTERIES

House butteries (kitchen areas) are provided for the shared use of all members of the House. They are stocked with bread, butter, spreads, fruit, cheese, ham, milk, tea, coffee, squash etc.

Each buttry has a kettle, toasted sandwich maker, fridge and dishwasher. Pupils are expected to clean up after themselves and to stack used cutlery and crockery in the dishwashers provided. Pupils may bring their own tuck boxes for the storage of dry foods.



MOBILE PHONES AND MOBILE COMPUTING DEVICES (MCDS)

Access to these devices is regulated for all pupils except the Second Year Specialists (Year 13).

All devices are handed in and locked in designated lockers at night. All devices remain in lockers during the working day, with the exception of one MCD (a tablet or laptop) which may be taken to and used in lessons and can be used to access emails during breaks.

Pupils are given access to their mobile phones before and after lessons, and can always ask a member of staff in House for permission to have their phone at other times, should they need to telephone home.



THE HUNT HEALTH CENTRE, MEDICINES AND HOMELY REMEDIES

If you are unwell or would like to seek medical advice for any reason, Charterhouse has a modern, purpose-built, on-site medical facility called the Hunt Health Centre ('HHC' for short). The HHC is staffed 24 hours a day by qualified nurses and there is a doctor available for consultations every weekday; physiotherapy treatment sessions are also available and normally take place in the Queen's Sport Centre (QSC).

In the first instance, duty staff in House will deal with minor issues and can issue homely remedies, such as paracetamol and ibuprofen. Duty staff will then refer pupils to the HHC if necessary. The HHC will contact parents/guardians if there is a problem or if a pupil needs to be taken home to recover from illness.



PARENTAL ACCESS TO HOUSE

Parents/guardians have full access to the House at the beginning and end of each term. However, in accordance with the School's safeguarding policy, they may not visit Houses unsupervised during term time.

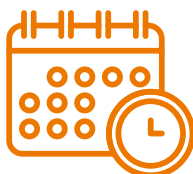
If parents wish to visit they should inform the House office in advance and sign in with the duty member of staff on arrival.



BEDTIMES

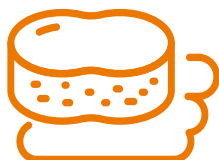
Bedtimes are staggered by year group. Pupils are expected to start getting ready for bed at least 15 mins before lights out.

DAY PUPIL TIMINGS

Drop off by 8am. Pick up between 6pm-7pm, or between 8.45pm-9.30pm.



DUTIES AND CHORES

There are a number of House duties that are assigned on a rotational basis to keep the House tidy and running smoothly and efficiently. These should be done effectively and with good grace – service is a core part of being a good community member!



FINDING STAFF AT NIGHT

The duty member of staff is always available at night, should they be needed. The HM, AsHM and Matron all have doorbells and a duty mobile phone.



HOUSE BANK AND SCHOOL ACCOUNT

Most pupils return to School at the start of the term with about £50.00 in cash. There is a House Bank into which pocket money should be paid. Pupils can make withdrawals from or pay in to the account on any day via the duty member of staff.

Pocket money can be used to cover purchases from the School tuck shop and other small items from the shops. Pocket money can be topped up with further cash if necessary during term. Cash cards, credit cards and digital payment apps (e.g. ApplePay) are not recommended. Large amounts of cash should never be kept in rooms.

If cash is to be banked on the first day of term, please hand it to the Housemaster/mistress in an envelope clearly marked with your name and the quantity.

The House Bank can also give credit, but only with parental permission. This is logged and signatures from both the duty member of staff and pupil are recorded. The debt at the end of the term is added to the individual's School bill.

Purchases from the School Shop (eg. pens, stationery, clothing, toothpaste, sports kit, etc.) can be made with a signed chit from the duty member of staff. All such purchases will be billed to parents via the School bill at the end of each term. Other items chargeable on the account are taxi fares for Exeat, Leave Weekends and End of Quarter (term) travel.

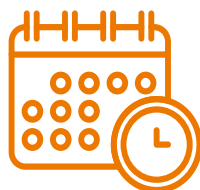


WEEKEND LEAVE ARRANGEMENTS

You are allowed to go home on Saturday afternoons after your School commitments have finished. This will generally be around 4:00pm but is dependent on timing of sports fixtures. You must return to School by 8.30pm (for Under School) and 9pm (for Specialists) on Sunday.

You may also choose to return on a Monday morning, but we ask that you are back in time for morning Adsum. The following conditions must be satisfied:

- Your parents complete the Weekend Leave request form online by 2pm on the Friday before the weekend in question.
- If you are going to stay with someone else, we must hear from both your parents (or, in the case of overseas pupils, your guardian) and the host family with the same request.
- You must remember that the School rules apply outside the School as well as within it.
- Your Housemaster/mistress may not grant you permission to leave school if we are not happy with the arrangements or with your School work or behaviour.



LEAVE WEEKENDS AND EXEATS

During Leave Weekends and Exeats, the School and Houses are closed. Your parents will need to complete the Leave Request form online providing us with details of your travel and return time.

Whenever you leave the School site, you are expected to sign out and back in again on your return.

WHAT WE EXPECT FROM YOU

At Charterhouse we aim to equip pupils to lead fulfilled and purposeful lives by providing an all-round education based on Christian values.

To this end Charterhouse expects you to adopt the highest standards of behaviour in all aspects of your lives at School (academic, boarding and co-curricular) and to embrace and embody the School's core values of Kindness, Responsibility, Open-mindedness, Moral Courage and Perseverance.

You are expected to:

- exhibit a high standard of personal behaviour and to work to the best of your ability at all times.
- be committed to your studies and should seek to pursue intellectual curiosity and develop the skills of independent learning.

- promote the happiness of the School community by being positive and helpful in all that you do. You should ensure that your behaviour does not adversely affect other pupils and take responsibility for reporting any concerns to a member of staff.
- let your Housemaster/mistress know where you are at all times.
- care for the School grounds and buildings so that future generations will benefit from them.
- take pride in your appearance, abide by the uniform requirements and to maintain high standards in both your dress and personal grooming.

In return, we will award Commendations for behaviour that exhibits the School Values in any aspect of your lives at School. You may also be awarded Academic Merits or Commendations for Attainment, Endeavour and Progress.

We will also recognise good behaviour through the awarding of positions of pupil responsibility in co-curricular activities, societies, School Council, Under School Monitors, House Monitors, Heads of Houses, School Monitors and Heads of School.



MEALTIMES

For all the girls' Houses and the new Houses, meals are served three times a day in the CDR. Old Houses eat in their own dining rooms. Mealtimes also serve as our registrations and you are checked in via your biometric thumbprint, so attendance is compulsory.

The food is exceptional here and there is a huge range of choice, but do alert your Housemaster/mistress if you have a particular dietary need.

At quarter (breaktime) snacks (toasties and pastries) are served from the CDR or old House dining rooms. Each House also has butteries which are like mini-kitchens. In these you can make drinks and snacks, but we ask that you don't take hot food to your rooms.

On Sunday, brunch is served for the whole School in the CDR. This is like a 'food extravaganza', and is really popular with pupils and staff as it is a very social occasion.



VISITING AND RELATIONSHIPS

Whilst you are at School, your House is considered your home and as such it is important that every person in that home respects the others in it. Therefore, we have a number of rules regarding visiting to keep you all safe.

- You are welcome to visit other pupils in their Houses. However, you must sign in and out and say hello to the Housemaster/mistress or other member of staff on duty.
- You may only visit in the common areas of the House and may not visit one another's bedrooms under any circumstance.
- Physically intimate or sexual relationships are not permitted at School. This applies to all pupils, genders and ages. It is perfectly reasonable to hug a friend at a moment of triumph or difficulty but as a general rule physical contact as part of a relationship is not appropriate in School.
- You may not invite someone from outside the School (including recent former pupils) into your House without the prior permission of your Housemaster/mistress or the duty House team member.
- Parents and guardians must sign in and out of Houses.



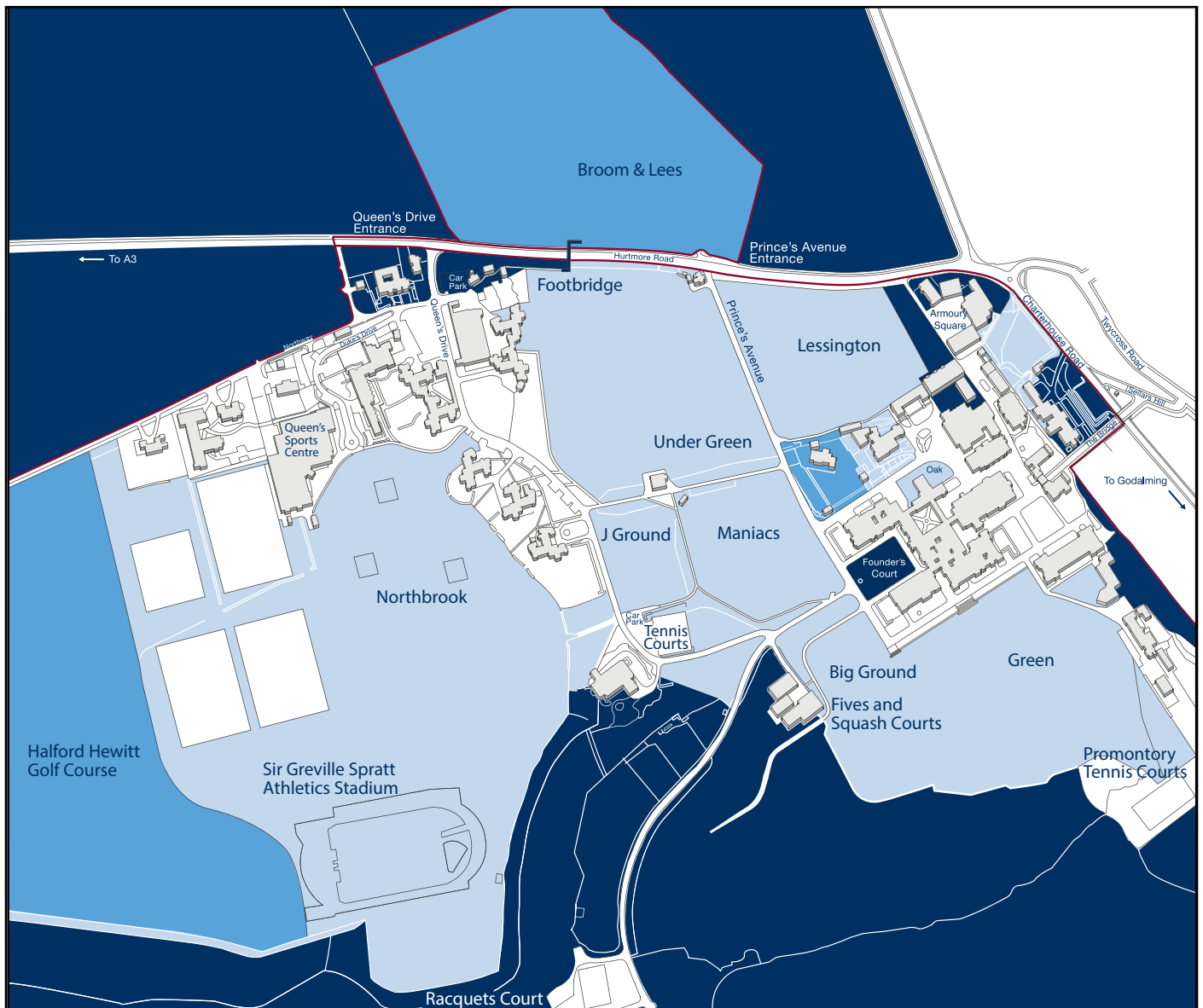
BOUNDS

You are not allowed to leave the School grounds without permission from your Housemaster/mistress.

You may, under certain circumstances visit Godalming or Guildford with permission from your Housemaster/mistress. At all times the School rules still apply.

- Godalming: Specialists may visit on a Tuesday or Thursday afternoon after you have completed all commitments, and all pupils may visit on a Saturday or Sunday. You must carry your chit with you at all times.
- Guildford: On Saturdays and Sundays, Specialists may request to go to Guildford between 2pm and 6pm, no more than four occasions in a Quarter, and not more than once per weekend. Again, you must carry your chit with you at all times.

Help and Support



THE HUNT HEALTH CENTRE

The School's health centre (HHC) is based over near the QSC and is staffed 24 hours a day by a wonderful team of registered nurses, and the school medical officer (GP) visits daily to hold surgeries.

We also have an HHC Hub in the centre of School which is open daily from 08:00-16:30 (closed for lunch 12:30-14:00) for anyone on the Old School side of the campus.

The staff look after your health and wellbeing whilst at School including:

- General ill health
- Support for physical or psychological health conditions
- Emergency ill health or first aid
- Health education
- Support or administration of medicine
- General health advice

It is important that you let the HHC know about any prescription medication you take. You must hand in all medication to Matron upon arrival where it will be looked after safely and dispensed appropriately.

If you feel unwell in the morning, you should let your Matron know. She will make an appointment for you to see a nurse at the HHC. Both the HHC and the Hub accept walk-ins as well. Occasionally you may require an overnight stay in the HHC if you are too unwell to stay in your boarding House, and there are also times in

which the nurse may contact your parents/guardians if they feel you need to go home to recover.

All boarders are expected to register with the school GP.

LEARNING CENTRE

Carthusian Dictionary

Here at Charterhouse we have a long, rich history that has led to the development and use of some rather unusual terms! Please use the glossary below to help you translate some of our more bizarre terminology.

ADSUM This is a roll-call held in House. Adsums can be formal: with the House list being read aloud by the person on duty, or informal: with names simply being ticked off by the duty member of staff when a pupil “checks in”.

ARTIFEX The annual arts festival held at the end of CQ (normally held in late June).

ATTAINMENT AND EFFORT

GRADES A form of academic assessment that occurs every 4-5 weeks. In addition to this formal process, regular discussions regarding progress, etc. are held between the pupil and his/her tutor.

BANCO A potentially confusing Charterhouse term. It is applied both to the work that is set to be done outside the classroom and to the specific time set aside for work in your rooms in the evenings (19:00-20:45). In the Under School the amount of ‘banco’ set for each evening should correlate to the ‘Banco’ time available, but Specialists are expected to work during private study periods and at other times in order to complete set work.

In simple terms: ‘banco’ (small ‘b’) refers to homework and ‘Banco’ (capital ‘B’) refers to the period of time in the evening in which to work.

BEAKS The Charterhouse term for teachers. They are also collectively referred to as members of Brooke Hall (the staff Common Room).

BTT The Ben Travis Theatre on Queen’s Drive, opened in 1983, and is named after the playwright who was an Old Carthusian.

BUTTERY These are small kitchen areas on each floor of House where pupils can make hot drinks and snacks. Bread, cheese, ham, biscuits, fruit and spreads are available in the butteries.

CDR Central Dining Room.

CHITS Items can be bought from the School Shop using the chit system. These must be signed by a member of the House staff and the costs will be added to the school bill. A signed “chit” is also required when a pupil would like to make a trip down into Godalming.

COMMENDATIONS may be awarded for one of the following reasons:

- Kindness
- Moral Courage
- Open-Mindedness
- Perseverance
- Responsibility
- Excellent Work

Any member of staff (teaching or support) may award a Commendation. Monitors may award commendations via their Housemaster/mistress.

CRACK This is the school tuck shop. The building itself is also referred to as Crown.

DIVISION The collective term for a group of pupils who are taught together in the same class. Often abbreviated to ‘Div’.

EXEAT Half term in the middle of each Quarter.

FIFTH A pupil in his third year of schooling at Charterhouse (Year 11).

FOUNDER’S FEAST A whole-school celebration of the founding of Charterhouse.

FOURTH A pupil in his first year of schooling at Charterhouse (Year 9). Also known as a Yearling.

HASHES The Charterhouse term for lessons.

HOMEBILL Homebill (dinner) is served from 18:00 to 18:55. Homebill is compulsory for all pupils. It may be attended in casual dress.

JDTC The John Derry Technical Centre is situated between Studio and Armoury and opened in 1980.

John Derry (the first British pilot to fly faster than sound) was an Old Carthusian.

GIBS (pronounced 'jibs') Another term for a formal Adsum in House.

MONITOR (School, House or Under School) Pupils given a formal position of responsibility within the School or House community.

OFF CHANGE The term used to describe a pupil who has been given permission (by the HHC) not to attend sports. Pupils will normally only be put 'Off Change' for medical reasons.

PINK BOOK Another term used to describe the School Calendar.

PMP Peter May Pavilion. The School Cricket pavilion, named after Old Carthusian, Peter Barker Howard May CBE (31 December 1929 – 27 December 1994): an English cricketer who played for Surrey County Cricket Club, Cambridge University and England, and was regarded by many as England's finest batsman in the post-war era.

PONTIFEX The annual Inter-House cross country races held in LQ.

QSC Queen's Sports Centre.

quarter (with a lower-case q) The mid-morning break from Monday to Saturday is called quarter.

QUARTER (with a capital Q) The school year is divided into three Quarters (don't ask!) or terms - Oration Quarter (September-December), Long Quarter (January – March; ironically the shortest term!) and Cricket Quarter (April - July). These are often known by their abbreviations OQ, LQ and CQ.

REMOVE A pupil in his second year of schooling at Charterhouse (Year 10).

RVW Music School situated on the south side of Memorial Chapel and opened in 1984, in memory of Ralph Vaughan Williams who was an Old Carthusian.

SPECIALISTS The top two years in the School, First Year Specialists (Year 12) and Second Year Specialists (Year 13). Often collectively referred to as Specs, or by their abbreviations: 1YS and 2YS.

UNDER SCHOOL The first three years in the school up to GCSE. The year groups are called Fourths (Yearlings), Removes and Fifths in ascending order.

YEARLING Another name for a Fourth.
