Educational Partnerships

Our educational partnerships are founded in the belief that we can all learn from each other. Schools share aspirations and ambitions for their pupils, and we can therefore benefit from closer relationships. We are delighted to work in partnership with several neighbouring schools in Surrey, and with some further afield as well. We believe that school partnerships should be equal, understanding, and mutually advantageous.

Broadwater-Charterhouse Educational Partnership

Between us, Broadwater and Charterhouse educate 1,300 young people in Godalming. We share a commitment to excellence in academic and co-curricular education, as well as to preparing young people for lives of personal fulfilment and achievement. We also share a fervent belief in the value of state-independent school partnerships and a commitment to wider society. Since 2018, Broadwater and Charterhouse have worked under a formal 'Memorandum of Understanding', through which we are pursuing a diverse range of opportunities and projects for pupils and staff.





"All teachers and students can learn from each other, and all schools improve when working together. The Broadwater-Charterhouse Educational Partnership has demonstrated this in a variety of ways, for example through regular staff seminars on topics such as safeguarding and classroom differentiation. Each week, Gabriel leads the after-school Enrichment Society at Green Oak, where members of Year 6 take part in debates, learn about politics and current affairs, and have Spanish lessons. He is also a music scholar at Charterhouse, founded the school's Equality Society, and has won awards from the UN and LSE for work on human rights.

"Green Oak has become a real highlight of my week. Although we are meant to be the 'teachers', I've learnt a huge amount – about leadership, communication, teamwork, and understanding different political and cultural perspectives. The pupils are brilliant: I wish we could spend more time there!"

Local Primary Schools

Godalming has many excellent infant, junior and primary schools with which we are delighted to partner. Like any good relationship, priorities are set and decisions made through a mutual process of discussion, and responding to circumstances, meaning there is no 'set model' for our primary school partnerships. As a result, they are always fresh and dynamic: we learn and grow together. Relationships are strengthened by Charterhouse staff serving as governors, including at Moss Lane Infants, Busbridge Infants, Godalming Junior, and St Mary's Shackleford.

"The creative arts are natural areas for partnership, not least because they don't always get much time in the regular school day. Annual 'Arty Mornings' at Charterhouse have become a real highlight of the year for us and our partners. In 2018, these involved 250 children from five local primary schools, who enjoyed African drumming, story-telling,

and performances from
Charterhouse musicians – plus
some chocolate and running
around. We also run a series of
music assemblies, where our top
performers give short recitals and
answer questions in local
primaries. At one school, this has
now developed into beginner
violin and piano lessons, given
by two of our Year 9 music
scholars. We really are putting
the 'art' in partnership!"





Shaftesbury Park Summer Camp

Shaftesbury Park is a unique and wonderful primary school in South London. Amongst its many remarkable features, Shaftesbury Park runs a bilingual stream, with pupils studying in both French and English; it is also a UNICEF Rights Respecting School, and has a special focus on enterprise. It serves a hugely diverse community with a number of local challenges.

Children from Shaftesbury Park attend a residential week at Charterhouse each summer, hosted by our sixth formers under the leadership of two teachers. The children are accommodated in one of our boarding houses, and take part in a wide range of activities from making rockets to climbing, and from swimming to camping out. It is a busy but very rewarding week, and is offered to those Shaftesbury Park pupils who would gain most from the experience. Evidence from Shaftesbury Park demonstrates the strong, positive impact which the course has on pupil attainment and attendance.

Aldridge Foundation

Charterhouse is delighted and proud to be an educational partner of the Aldridge Foundation, which runs academies and helps transform communities through enterprise and entrepreneurship. We have a special relationship with the Kensington Aldridge Academy, an outstanding school in West London.

We enjoy regular teacher development sessions with colleagues at the Kensington Aldridge Academy (KAA), and were privileged to welcome KAA pupils affected by the tragic Grenfell Fire tower for residential summer camps in 2017. Joint pupil activities with KAA have included a visit to the London School of Economics, and a successful conference on 'Britishness', where pupils heard from expert speakers including a human rights barrister, a BBC journalist, and the Chaplain to the House of Commons.

Science and Sports Outreach

Charterhouse has a longestablished programme of science outreach, including revision sessions for local GCSE students. We have developed a highly successful series of professional development workshops for science teachers, including an ever-popular Summer Residential School delivered in partnership with the Institute of Physics and Surrey University.

From 2019, this outstanding partnership work has developed in a new and hugely exciting direction. Charterhouse has established a SCITT (School-Centred Initial Teacher Training) unit, in partnership with the IoP, and become a regional hub for science teacher education.

Our Sports Department also enjoys working with a range of educational partners, for example through our annual MCC Cricket Hub and the 'Chance to Shine' sports outreach programme.

Contributing to our community

Carthusians are encouraged to feel part of, and play a part in, the wider community of Godalming – a thriving and delightful town with a huge amount going on. The School itself is one of the town's largest employers, and our staff have served as councillors, Rotarians, Chamber of Commerce members, and directors of community groups and charities. We love sharing our facilities with local organisations such as the Godalming Theatre Group, and hosting dinners for local charities. But the core of our commitment to the area is our pupils, both through social action and fundraising projects.

Service Leadership & Community Action

Our new Service Leadership and Community Action programme is for all pupils in Years 9 to 12, renewing our ongoing commitment to these central areas of school life. Our wide range of partners includes schools, care homes, community and religious groups, and local charities, and the benefits of volunteering are felt by our own pupils as well as the amazing organisations we work with. Pupils also develop critical teamwork, leadership and volunteering skills through our internal programmes, such as the Outdoor Education curriculum in the Under School (Years 9-11), or through participation in the Combined Cadet Force and Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. Our musicians regularly perform for the wider community, for example singing carol concerts in nearby nursing homes.

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Charitable Fundraising

The Charities Committee is one of Charterhouse's largest and busiest pupil-led societies. A huge range of activities take place each year, including the ever-popular Christmas and Valentine's Day sales! All charities are chosen by the pupils themselves: recently, we have been honoured to raise funds for local charities such as The Simon Trust, Shooting Star Chase, The Meath, Robbie's Rally and the Fountain Centre.

Global Citizenship

Charterhouse is a proudly British school with a wonderfully international population. Our aim is to inspire our pupils to be 'global citizens', contributing something new to the world they live in. As part of this, the whole school takes part in a Citizenship Education programme covering topics from suffrage to social media, healthcare to human rights. These values are lived out through our international partnerships, involving both pupils and staff in life-changing work abroad.

Myanmar

Situated in rural Shan State, the Phayar Taung Youth Development Centre is an exceptional community school, attached to a monastery on the shores of Lake Inle. The first Charterhouse teachers visited in January 2018, with a larger delegation returning in August 2018 to lead the inaugural 'Teaching Development Programme'. This impactful and moving week, designed and led by Charterhouse teachers, centred on improving pedagogy and assessment for forty young educators in the region.

South Africa

Mellon Educate is a genuinely life-changing charity, providing school buildings and resources for the poorest communities in South Africa. Charterhouse's relationship with this amazing organisation began in 2017, when pupils raised £20,000 to support Mellon's work in the South African townships.

The first Charterhouse 'Student Blitz' took place in August 2018, with 15 pupils and three teachers visiting Cape Town. The focus of the week was teaching literacy and science in three township schools, serving the Khayelitsha community; it was a powerful experience for all involved. As well as leading lessons, Carthusians studied alongside their South African peers.

For a week, we taught at three schools in the Khayelitsha township. We also made a joint study trip to Robben Island with 25 Mellon Educate interns, where we all affirmed our commitment to renewable energy sources and lit the solar torches we had built together! I decided to continue fundraising for our friends at Mellon, and am proud that my boarding house raised funds for their new literacy programme. For me personally, the trip has cemented my desire to pursue a career in international development."
